This country has faced a challenging year. Veterans have faced a challenging year. The VFW has faced a challenging year.

In spite of the challenges thrown at us, the VFW has shown its grit. Our Comrades

have shown our communities that we are here to serve. We have seen much darkness in the past year, but we have countless stories of service that should make us all proud.

A few months ago, a recently homeless veteran called the Department asking for a ride to a job interview an hour from where he was staying. Two phone calls and a day later, fellow Comrade Gordon Shipley of St. Johns Post 4113 volunteered. Gordon knew nothing of this veteran, other than the veteran had served in the Army in Iraq, and was working to get back on his feet. It was a two hour round trip, in the middle of the pandemic, but that veteran got to his interview.

Another Comrade, Air Force Vietnam Veteran, Bob Bull from Graf-O'Hara Post 423, felt that our country could do more to recognize the service, and the recent passing of a local veteran who had earned the Medal of Honor in the Vietnam War. Comrade Bull contacted U.S. Senator Gary Peters and his local Congresswoman, Debbie Dingell. Over the following several months, he persistently "urged" them to rename the Ann Arbor VA Medical Center in this veterans honor, which drew the

support of the Department, the American Legion and other VSOs. In the Fall of 2020, a bill was introduced. It has since become law. The Ann Arbor VA will now be named the "Lt. Colonel Charles S. Kettles VA Medical Center".

While working on the renaming of the Ann Arbor VA, Comrade Bull led a group of other Comrades, along with the American Legion, to begin providing office hours two days a week at his home VFW Post. The goal of this was to help veterans in the community and for the Post to serve as a Veterans Resource Center of sorts. Since opening, the Post has helped veterans and their families get connected to service officers to file benefit claims; assisted in connecting veterans in crisis to health professionals at the VA; and has helped veterans in need of housing and food. They are expanding to serve three days a week.

In January, Adams-Rockey Post 6056 in Springport hosted a blood drive. In December, Henry Walters Post 2144 in Holland passed out 108 gifts to children; distributed holiday baskets to community members in need; regularly checked in on their senior Comrades who have been restricted to their homes due to Covid; and they provided rides to veterans so they could go grocery shopping, "as we have always done".

Stories like these are occurring every day in the VFW. We applaud all of the incredible efforts of our Comrades across our State. The VFW was built to serve. Our Comrades continue to serve. Together, we will be Veterans Moving Forward, serving forever.

DEPARTMENT QUARTERMASTER, DEREK BLUMKE

In the quarter century following the close of World War II, the Veterans of Foreign Wars experienced explosive growth. This was due to the return of

U.S military veterans after WWI, WWII, the Korean War, and further complemented by the military buildup for the Vietnam War. In 1970, veterans and members of the U.S. Armed Forces accounted for 47% of the U.S. population, nearly half of all Americans.

The representation of U.S. military veterans in the population today is now only 7% of all Americans. VFW membership has mirrored this population shift, through no fault of our own. Approximately thirty years ago, the VFW Department of Michigan boasted over 100,000 members. The number is now a little over 32,000.

Today, 80% of our Comrades are over the age of 65 years-of-age. When additionally factoring for the harms of Agent Orange, it is

possible we lose 30-40% of our membership in the next five to seven years.

Compounding these challenges is that the most recent generation of veterans has been slow to join our ranks. There are a variety of reasons for this. When the veterans of the War on Terror returned home, we never meaningfully asked these veterans and their families what they needed. Had we done so, we would have heard them tell us they needed help getting a job; starting businesses; transitioning to college; and assistance with childcare. These are all things the previous generations of veterans needed.

Currently, we are experiencing a contraction of our posts. This is natural. It was already occurring, but the pandemic has been a tipping point, accelerating this contraction at a rate that in other times would not be natural. Currently these closures are happening ad hoc, without a strategy and without regard for the gap they are leaving in the communities, where other VSOs also do not exist.

As the Department Quartermaster, it is

my duty to safeguard the financial health of the VFW Department of Michigan, today, and looking forward to decades to come. This is why I share these things. It is not, and cannot, take away from any of our incredible accomplishments over the past 120 years.

I share all of this, to ask for your feedback. What do you think the VFW should look like in the next 10 and 20 years? What do you think we should be doing? How many posts should we have? Where do they absolutely need to be?

The VFW led the creation of the Department of Veterans Affairs; worked on the original GI Bill of Rights; fought for Vietnam Veterans harmed by Agent Orange; led the passage of the Post 9/11 GI Bill. Today, we again fight for veterans exposed to toxins overseas, and for veterans being failed by the VA's mental health system.

The VFW cannot merely exist, it MUST THRIVE, and I ask you to think of ways we can ensure we THRIVE and continue God's work for a century to come.

During these checks, dues and continuing membership can be discussed. Department can provide a list of "at large" members throughout the state. Efforts to contact these members should be made with an invitation to join your post.

Lastly I would again like to remind Post and District Commanders that the VFW Foundation has established the Post Pandemic Relief Grant Program. If your post is having financial difficulties because of the pandemic you are able to apply for a Post Pandemic Relief Grant. Eligibility requirements have been revised and application procedures are available on the National website.

As we enter 2021 let us keep a positive attitude and strive to preserve and strengthen comradeship among our members. If I can be of any assistance to you or your post please do not hesitate to call me. Please stay safe.

The VFW National Council of Administration has been having many meetings via ZOOM due to COVID-19. At our last Zoom Meeting, we were told that the (52) National Voice of Democracy Department Winners and National Patriot's Pen Winner will not be having their Washington DC Trip in March 2021 due to COVID-19 Restrictions and Safety. Lynn Rolf, Director of VFW Programs is working on an alternate program for the Department Winners. As soon as I receive

word, I will get it out to the District Commanders. I also received an email today stating that as a direct result of the escalation of COVID-19 cases around the US, the Commander-in-Chief has decided that we will be holding a virtual National Council of Administration meeting to include Committee meetings and workshop to be held March 3 – March 7, 2021.

I now want to talk about membership. Membership is VERY IMPORTANT to ME and should be very important to everyone. On Monday, December 14th, 2020, I looked at Memstats on the VFW National website. National was at 87.81%. National Membership total was at 917,875 members. Our goal is to help our Commander-in-Chief Hal Roesch achieve his goal of 100% by June 30, 2021. That is 127,369 additional members or a total of 1,045,244 members by June 30, 2021.

On Monday, December 14, 2020, Michigan was in 16th place out of 52 Departments at 89.34%. CONGRATULATIONS! KEEP IT UP! Michigan can achieve 100% by June 30, 2021.

In the Big Ten Conference, Michigan is in 4th Place at 89.34% out of 10 Departments. CONGRATULATIONS AGAIN! Minnesota is in 1st Place at 92.00%. Wisconsin is in 2nd Place at 90.31%. Nebraska is in 3rd Place at 89.41%. Michigan can be in 1st Place in the Big Ten Conference by June 30th, 2021. KEEP IT UP! WE CAN DO IT!

Michigan has 32,527 members. Michigan needs 3,878 members to achieve 100% by June 30th, 2021. WE CAN DO IT! MICHIGAN CAN ACHIEVE 100%!

I told you at our Fall Conference 2020, that I wanted to be transparent with all of you as your National Council of Administration Member representing YOU and the Department of Michigan. I have been communicating with our Department Council of Administration including every District Commander on a weekly basis. I hope every Post in the Department of Michigan is receiving my weekly emails from your District Commander.

I was told by our MOV Editor, Stacey Roberts, that I am limited to 500 words. I am at 498 words!! I wish I could tell you more!

MIA UPDATE AS OF 12/18/20 FROM VFW ACTION CORP.

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced two new identifications and three burial updates for service members who have been missing and unaccounted-for from World War II and Korea. Returning home for burial with full military honors are:

- U.S. Navy Fireman 1st Class Paul E. Saylor, 21, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Saylor.
- Army Pvt. Hillary Soileau, 23, was a member of Company F, 2nd Battalion, 27th Infantry Regiment, 25th Infantry Division, when American forces went on the offensive to clear Guadalcanal of Japanese Forces. Soileau was wounded on Jan. 14, 1943, during fighting on a group of hills nicknamed Galloping Horse. Following the battle, he could not be found. Soileau was declared missing in action on Feb. 3, 1943, and officially declared killed in action on Dec. 13, 1945.
- Navy Seaman 2nd Class Charles A. Jones, 21, of Harvard, Nebraska, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Jones. Jones will be buried in his hometown.
- Marine Corps Cpl. Elmer E. Drefahl, 22, of Milwaukee, was assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which was moored at Ford Island, Pearl Harbor, when the ship was attacked by Japanese aircraft on Dec. 7, 1941. The USS Oklahoma sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including Drefahl.
- Army Sgt. Billy V. Rodgers, 19, was a member of Company A, 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 31st Regimental Combat Team, 7th Infantry Division. He was reported missing in action on Dec. 2, 1950, when his unit was attacked by enemy forces near the Chosin Reservoir, North Korea. Following the battle, his remains could not be recovered.

Are you an active member or a member in name only?

An active member comes to meetings, functions, programs, or other activities at the post home. An active member will write letters to legislative representatives at state and national offices. An active member helps veterans get to doctor appointments, go to the store or bank. An active member helps veterans who are hospitalized or in a nursing home. An active member will assist the president, officers, and chairmen in carrying out their duties.

A member in name only is one who joins the organization and ends their participation at that point. A member in name only could also be a senior who has been active in the past but is now limited either physically or financial and feels they can no longer participate in functions and programs. Maybe they are now in a nursing home. Maybe they are out of a job. Maybe they feel that what they do is unimportant/doesn't matter. Each individual has unique abilities.

Not everyone is destined to become the president on the first day. But each member has become a member due to a connection to someone who served in the military during a time of war.

Our connection to one another is that--our

loved ones who put their life on the line to protect and defend a belief that all men and women are created equally and are entitled to the freedom to pursue life, liberty, and happiness.

So, are you a member just to have an extra card in your wallet? If you say you are an active member have you given or sent a written report to the auxiliary president so your actions can be included in the auxiliary reports to the department office? PUSHING FORWARD IN LEGISLATIVE

On Wednesday, December 16th, the House passed its final vote on passage of H.R. 7105, Johnny Isakson and David P. Roe, M.D. Veterans Health Care and Benefits Improvement Act of 2020, which passed the Senate in early December and now heads to the president for signature. This legislation includes several VFW-supported bills that were pending in the 116th Congress.

- Most notably the Deborah Sampson Act, which would break the cultural barrier impacting women veterans by requiring VA to address privacy concerns and improve access, expand the amount of time new mothers are given to find health care coverage for their newborns, increase staff cultural competency, eliminate harassment and assault, and make other much-needed improvements to women veterans' health care. This forward looking focus legislation would also examine outcomes to women veterans' services by requiring studies and reports on barriers to receipt of care, gap analysis on services for homeless women veterans, the availability of prosthetics for women, and other topics.
- Would require VA to make Disability Benefits Questionnaires available for public use, again.
- Would lower the age from 57 to 55 to remarry without incurring penalties for surviving spouses receiving Dependency and Indemnity Compensation
- Would modernize the Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance (SDVI) program.
- Would require VA to study incidents of cancer and other illnesses experienced by service members who served at the Karshi-Khanabad (K2) Air Base in Uzbekistan between Oct. 1, 2001, and Sept. 30, 2005.
- Would change the statutory definition of Vietnam veteran to include individuals who served in the Republic of Vietnam from Nov. 1, 1955, to Feb. 27, 1961.
- Would increase certain veteran funeral benefits and authorize VA to add spouses and eligible dependent children to VA-furnished headstones.
- Would increase from \$5 million to \$10 million the maximum amount VA may grant in a fiscal year to states and tribal organizations for maintaining veterans' cemeteries.
- Would call for the elimination of the 12-year limit on using Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) benefits.
- Would require VA to create a database on its website to explain public institution requirements for in-state tuition.
- Would expand benefits and services for homeless veterans.
- Would create certain education, employment, and housing protections for veterans impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The passage of this veterans' legislation package satisfies a number of VFW resolutions and legislative priorities regarding women veterans' health care, disability assistance and memorial affairs, and economic opportunity issues.
